the merry month of May, The Folly hosted the 4th annual Kansas City Burlesque Festival. Burlesque Legend Tempest Storm, now 86 years old, returned as a Judge for the 2014 Queen of Kansas City Burlesque competition.

Jim Peterson Snags Another Faire!

The Greater St. Louis Renaissance Faire opened in 1999 in Wentzville, Missouri. Renaissance St. Louis was a non profit educational organization dedicated to the history of the 14th to the 16th century of Europe. Most of the participants, including the staff, were volunteers. This year, the faire was taken over by Jim Peterson and Mid America Festivals. Initial reports have been positive. Management's emphasis shifted from education to entertainment. For the first time in the faire's 16 year history, substantial amounts of money were spent on advertising. Attendance records were broken. If the growth continues, as is anticipated, the show may soon need a new location. Mid America Festivals also operates renaissance faires in Florida, Michigan, Kansas and Minnesota. The Minnesota Renaissance Festival may also be needing a new location. The property where the festival has operated since 1974 is also home to a company that quarries limestone, gravel and silica sand. Silica sand has

recently increased in value. Parts of The Minnesota Renaissance Festival's parking lot have become sand and



gravel pits. The front gate is no longer accessible from the main parking lot. Craftspeople have been assured, in writing, that the festival will continue to operate in its current location until at least 2016 but sooner or later, relocation seems unavoidable.

Tempest in a Teapot?

There has been plenty of conversation and speculation going on amongst the participants of the New York Renaissance Faire in Tuxedo, New York. New York State officials have grown weary of seeing money flowing out of New York and into casinos in Atlantic City, New Jersey. They have decided that New York should have some casinos of its own. The State has made licenses available for four casinos. 22 applications with the required \$1 million application fees were submitted to a state gambling panel in April. About 12 are for the Catskills and Hudson Valley region. A Malaysian corporation, Genting Group, wants to build their casino on the land currently occupied by the New York Renaissance Faire and the Tuxedo Ridge Ski Center. They want to continue to operate the renaissance faire and the ski center but they have plans to build some enhancements. They want to add two hotels, a casino, some restaurants, a botanical garden, and three new festivals in the spring, summer and fall to supplement the summertime renaissance faire. They also plan to build a tram to bring visitors to the top of Tuxedo Ridge, some zip lines, hiking, biking and motorcycle trails, and a world-class spa. They plan to spend 25 million dollars to build a new highway interchange on the New York State Thruway and a new

road directly from the Thruway to the site. The total cost of the project is expected to be somewhere around 750 million dollars. Genting Group says that their Sterling Forest Resort would create 2,000 new jobs averaging \$50,000 a year and it would more than double the tax base of the Town of Tuxedo. The Town of Tuxedo has already written a letter of support for the project in spite of many objections from local residents. Now the decision is up to the State of New York. It would seem that the Tuxedo site has less than a 20% chance of being chosen but people in the gambling business often find ways to improve their odds. Renaissance Entertainment Productions, the company that currently runs the fair along with two other fairs in California and Wisconsin, has issued the following statement on their website in response to the news: "The New York Renaissance Faire is in the midst of making numerous improvements — including the addition of a new stage and dozens more performers — as we look ahead to a crowd-pleasing 2014 season. We look forward to spending many years entertaining our loyal customers and to continuing our longtime outstanding relationship with the local community." The State of New York will be announcing their choices for the sites of their new casinos sometime this fall.

Snowden Leaks Reveal a Surprise for Abbot!

Four Star General Keith Alexander became head of the National Security Agency in 2005. He retired on March 28, 2014. During his time at the NSA, he presided over a massive build up of cyber data collection capabilities. Minutes. Below it is a crop from the first grade class photo with Keith Alexander on the left. A close inspection of the ears and the eyes seems to confirm that recently retired Four Star General Keith Alexander is indeed the same guy who used to bully our Abbot as a child.



Obituaries

Last January, our Abbot rode on commercial airliners for the first time



since he was discharged from the army forty years ago. Brother Lee's (Ashley Nichols') father, Jerry Nichols, died in Daytona Beach, Florida on January 14 at the age of 64. Jerry had built and operated mazes and games at renaissance faires for more than thirty years. Jerry had been suffering from ALS (Lou Gehrig's Disease) for several years. Brother Lee piloted his boat out into the Atlantic Ocean with a

crew comprised of 7 of Jerry's friends and family members. Jerry had been cremated and his ashes were in an urn made of Himalayan salt. Our Abbot spoke some words as a whale surfaced nearby and Ashley dropped the ocean soluble urn into the briny deeps. A pelican flew alongside the boat on its way back to shore. In spite of the somber occasion, Our Abbot enjoyed meeting and eating with members of the Nichols family during his unexpected trip to Florida.

During a European vacation, Sharon Tysseling suffered multiple aneurysms and she died on Sunday, May 18, at Regions Hospital in St. Paul, Minnesota. She was 62 years old at the time of her death. Sharon and her husband Mark had operated food booths at renaissance fairs for more than thirty years.

Renaissance Pleasure Faire creator Phyllis Patterson, of Novato, California, died on May 18th, 2014, at the age of 82. It was the closing day of this year's southern California show. Phyllis opened the very first Renaissance Faire in America on May 11th-12th, 1963 in North Hollywood, California. Little did she know that she was birthing an industry which would provide careers for thousands of soon to be rennies. Her influence on American history has been greater than most people can imagine.
